"The true art in art theft is not in the stealing... It's in the selling."

Art clearly has value, both cultural and economic, but the precise measures of this value within the art world are not widely understood. Whilst researching and creating pieces for my previous show 'Priceless', my fascination with the economic structures within the art world grew. Some people appreciate an artwork for the image itself, and others for the space it occupies - physically, socially, financially and culturally. I became interested in how art theft alters these equations.

The perceived cultural and financial value of a stolen artwork changes, often dramatically, once something so recognisable is pinched. Reports about art crime tend to glamourise the activity, often highlighting the monetary value loss and negating to factor in the vast cultural losses, which carry a far greater impact on society. Each piece lost represents a partial loss of our heritage. My fascination is not with the artworks themselves, but the stories behind the thefts. What is the motivation? Why that piece? And how does the theft influence the artwork's place in our current cultural landscape? Pinched explores the stories behind the stolen art.

Most things become more interesting once we've lost them. An umbrella left on the tube takes on far greater value once the realisation of its absence is noted, particularly in the presence of clouds. Things take on greater significance not because of their worth or value, but because of the possibilities their absence presents. The same is true in the art world.

As explored in 'Priceless', the current market provides numerous examples of artworks fetching prices that seem to defy economic principals. Members of the criminal underworld have also noticed this apparent discrepancy in the financial value of art. Contrary to popular beliefs, it's not all private jets, secret compartments and men in bowler hats. This collection includes: accounts of a broken doorknob and a slight, moustached man in a white smock lurking in a gallery cleaning closet with the Mona Lisa tucked under his garments; some gilet wearing, Axe wielding tourists in sun hats visiting a Scottish highland castle and escaping out a window with another Da Vinci; and two guys posing as policemen, who gaffer taped unexperienced security, then made off with 13 priceless works of art by world-renowned artists such as Rembrandt, Vermeer, Manet, and Degas.

If these pieces were not stolen to order to hang in a Bond villain's lair, who is stealing them, and why? Art theft has turned into a global industry that experts believe now fuels everything from terrorism to drug-running. At least one art sleuth puts art crime, including stolen antiquities and traffic in forgeries, behind only drugs and arms trafficking as the third-most lucrative criminal activity in the world, at \$2 to \$6 billion a year. Consider that a stolen artwork often only raises 10% of its true value on the black market. The remaining 90% is occupied by the risk of ownership. Why steal something with so little a return on it's value? It seems that the majority are stolen as collateral for shady underground activities.

But what of the cultural impacts of these thefts? Prior to the much publicised pilfering of 1911, the Mona Lisa hung in one of the Louvre's many galleries without pomp and ceremony amidst a mass of other artworks relatively unknown to the uninitiated. The notoriety she gained from the heist drew the masses to view the empty wall space. The details surrounding the case captured the curiosity of the crowds catapulting her to international infamy. Much like the umbrella left on the tube, her absence is where her value lay.

So what is it about art theft that holds such magnetism over our current social and cultural landscape, turning audiences into installation pieces, who have no idea that their gathering in the void left by a famous theft is the true work of art? What are they looking for? What is the fascination?

'Pinched' aims to shed some light on the often surprising, always colourful wealth of stories behind the heists.

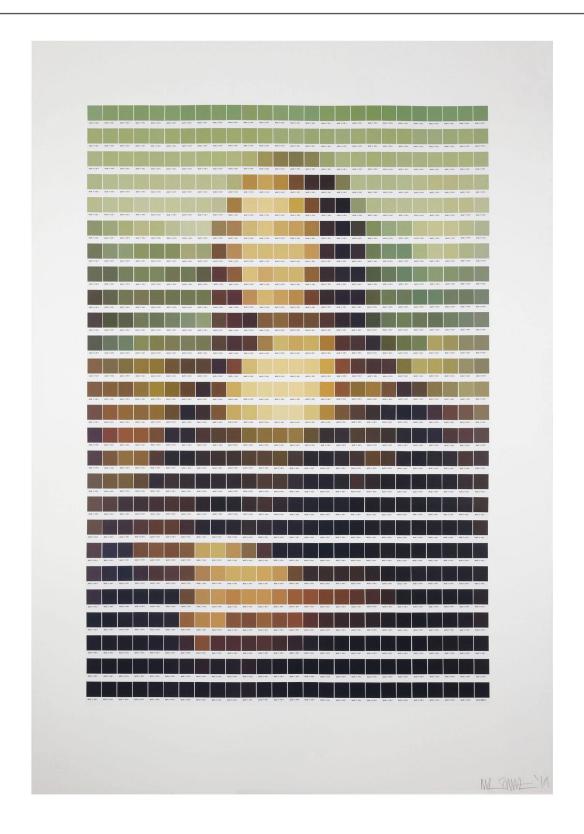

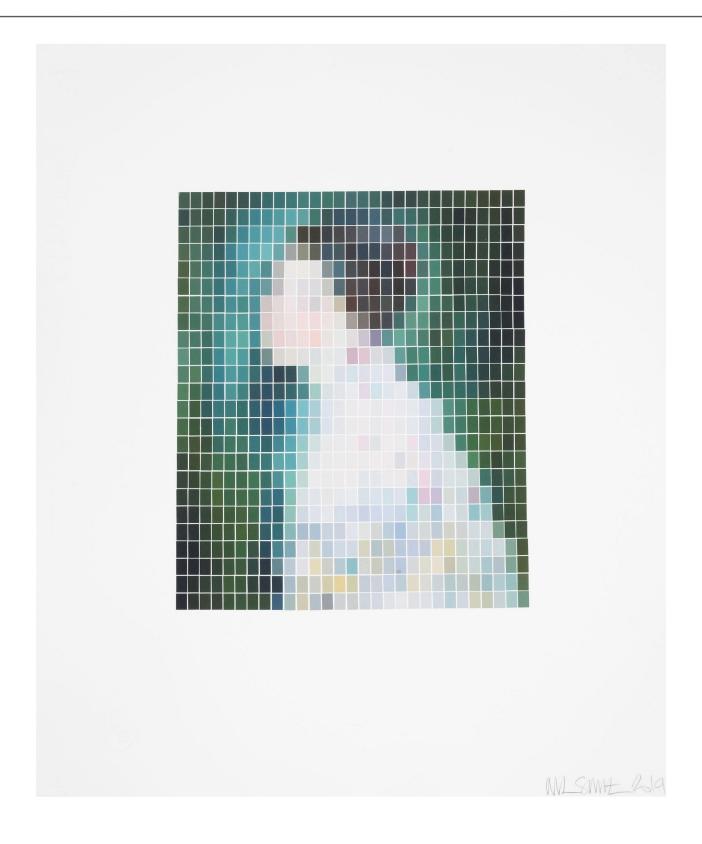
Louvre Wall with Door Knob (Mona Lisa)

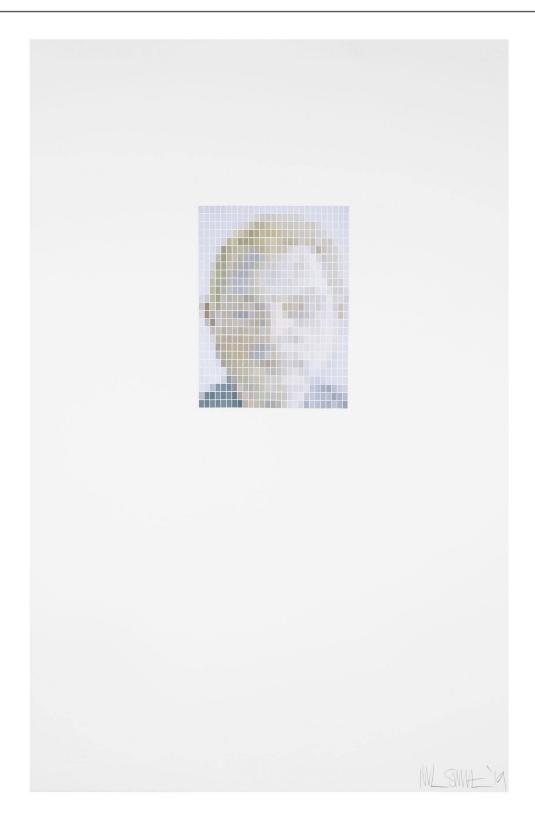

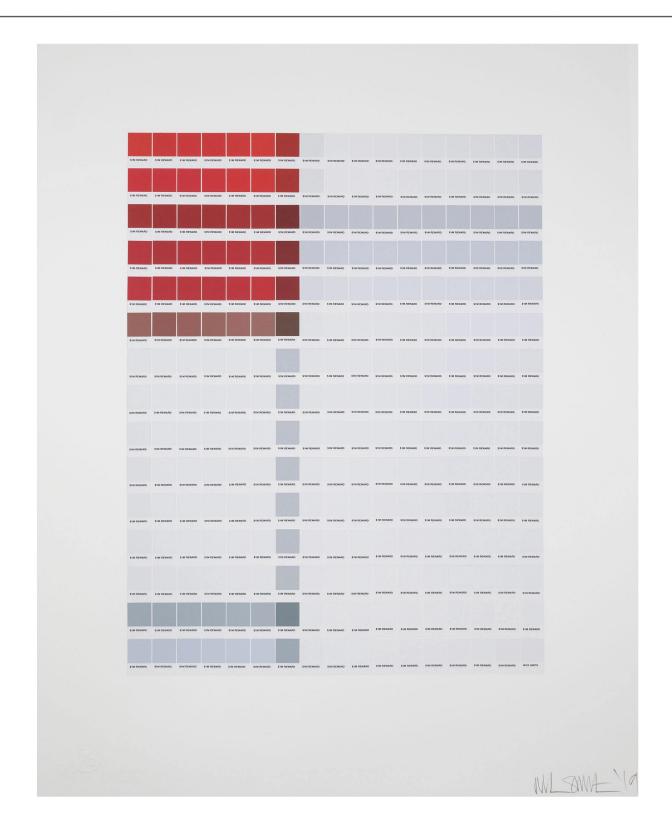
Lucian Freud - Francis Bacon portrait - (Microchip)

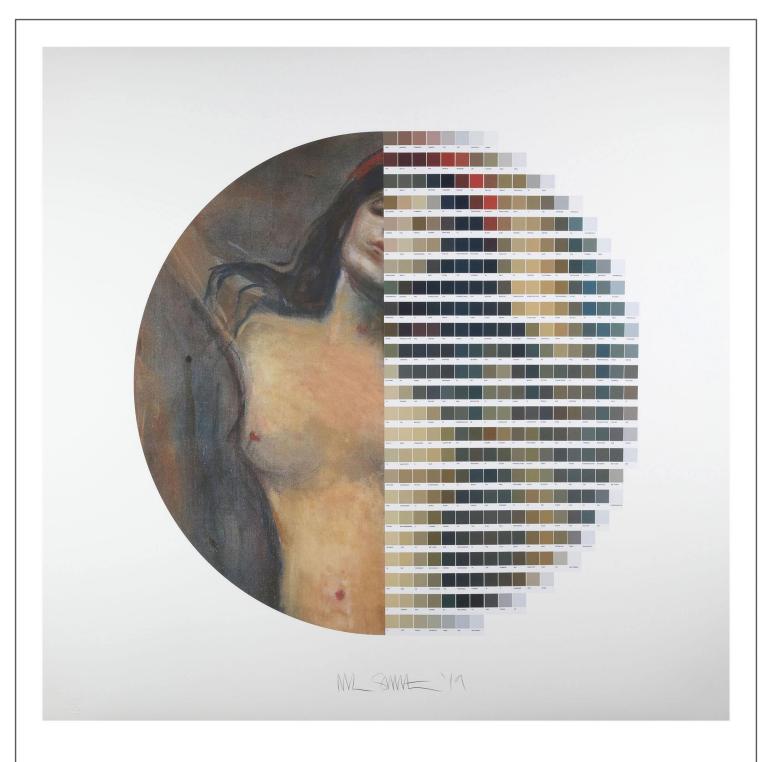

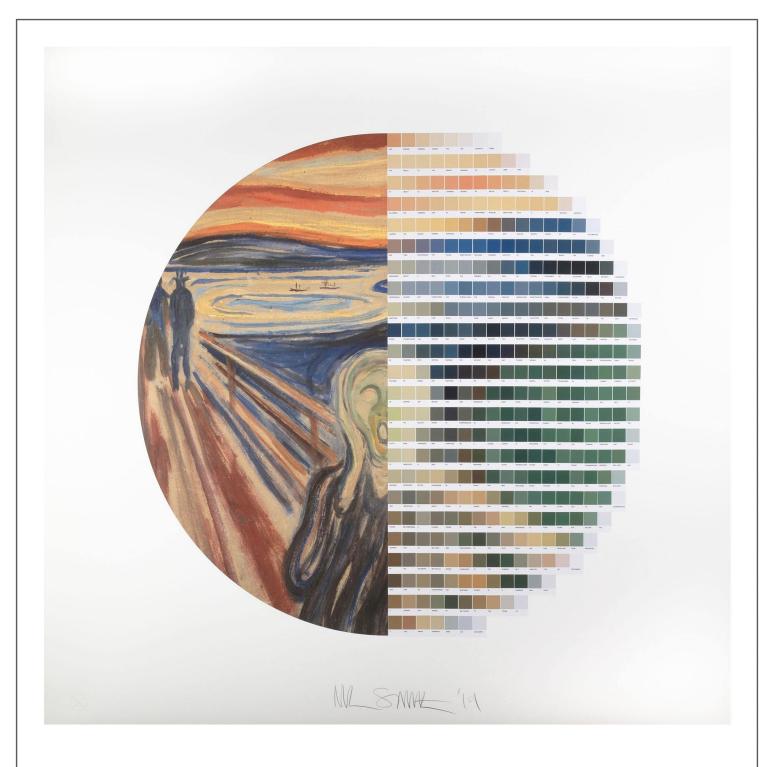
Munch - Madonna

Munch - Scream

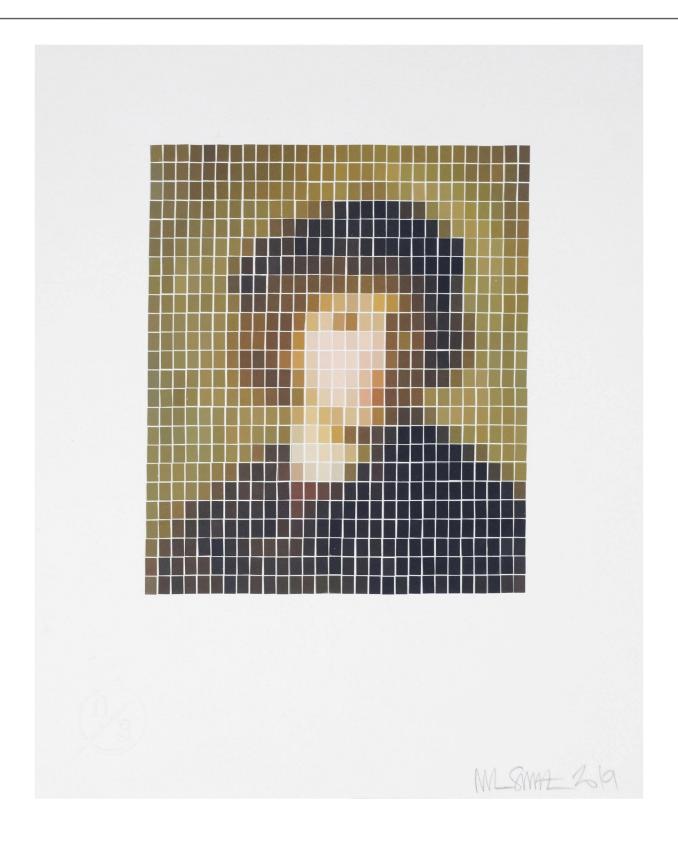

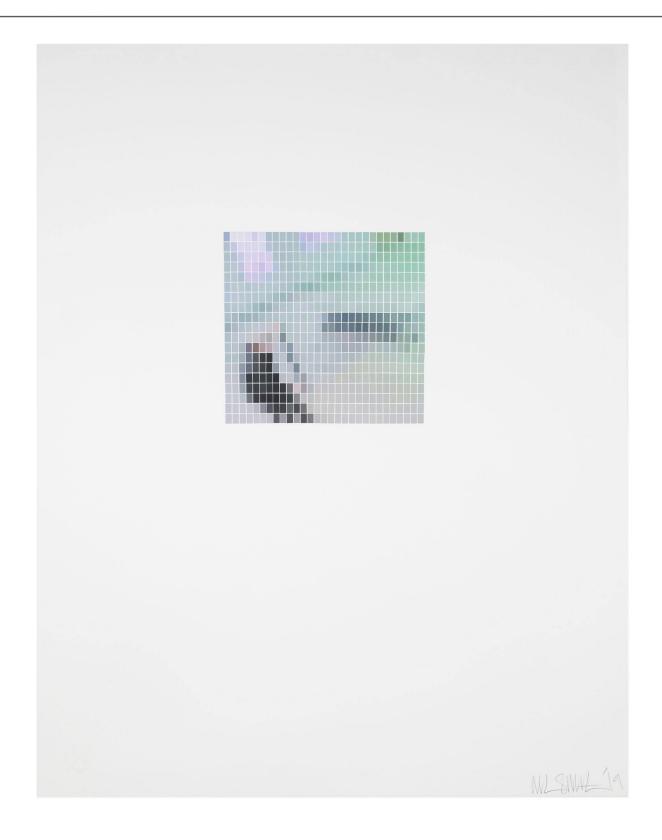

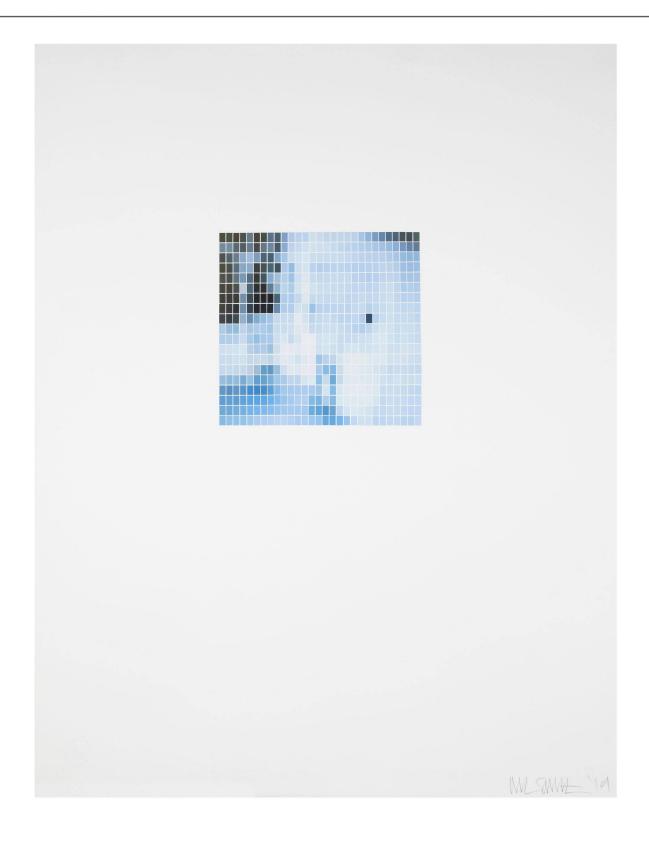
Theft of a Banksy CCTV - (Microchip)
